STRONGER COMMUNITIES ACTION FUND (SCAF)

The Stronger Communities Action Fund (SCAF) was a Child, Youth and Family initiative started in 2000 that guaranteed funding for four years to seven communities who registered poorly on the deprivation index. It allowed these communities to assess their own needs, identify solutions to these needs and work towards implementing these solutions. Two further communities were added to the pilot in 2002, one of these being Aranui.

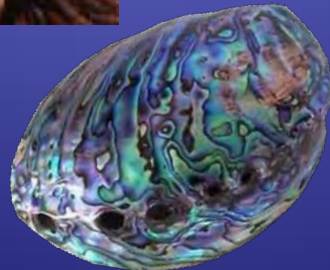

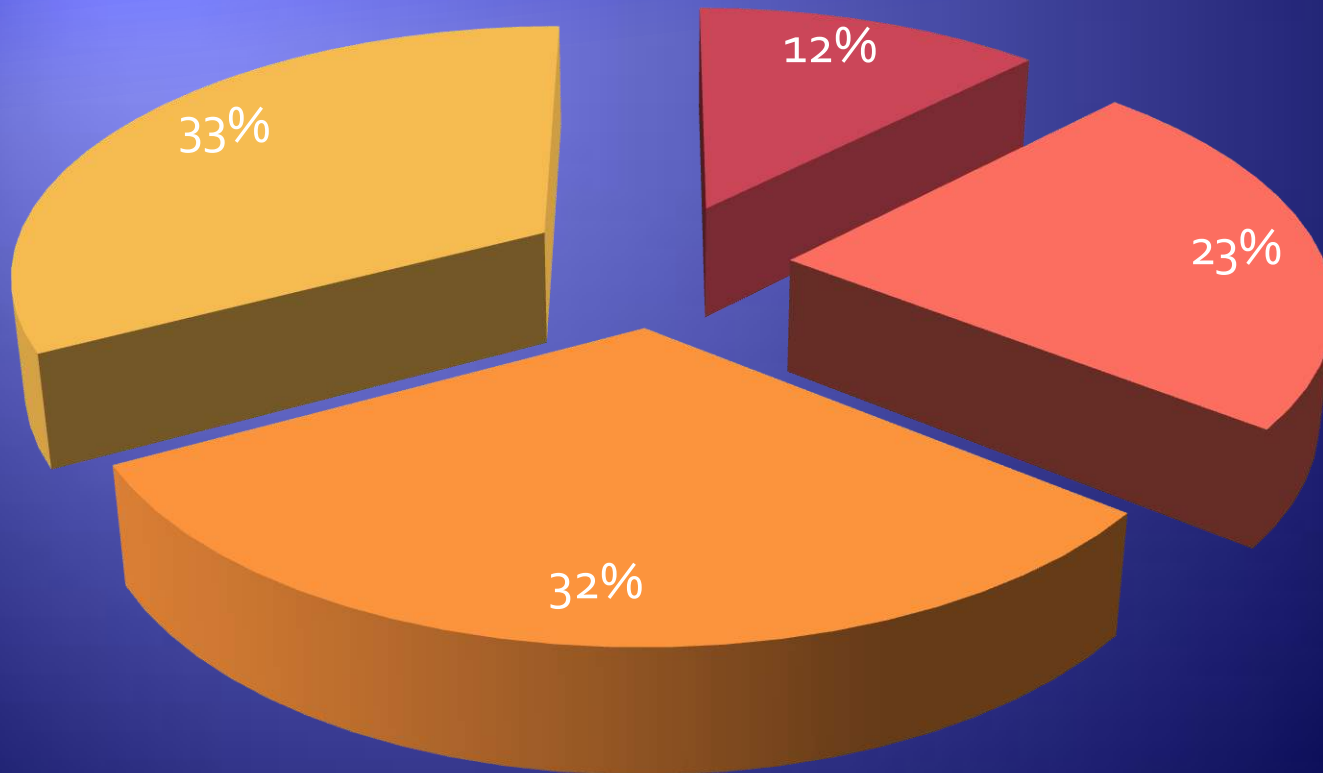

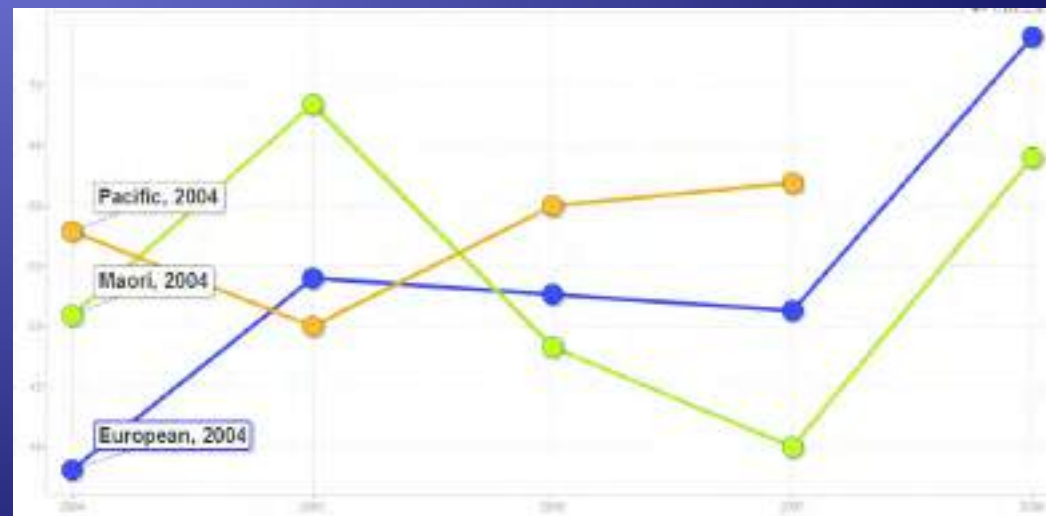

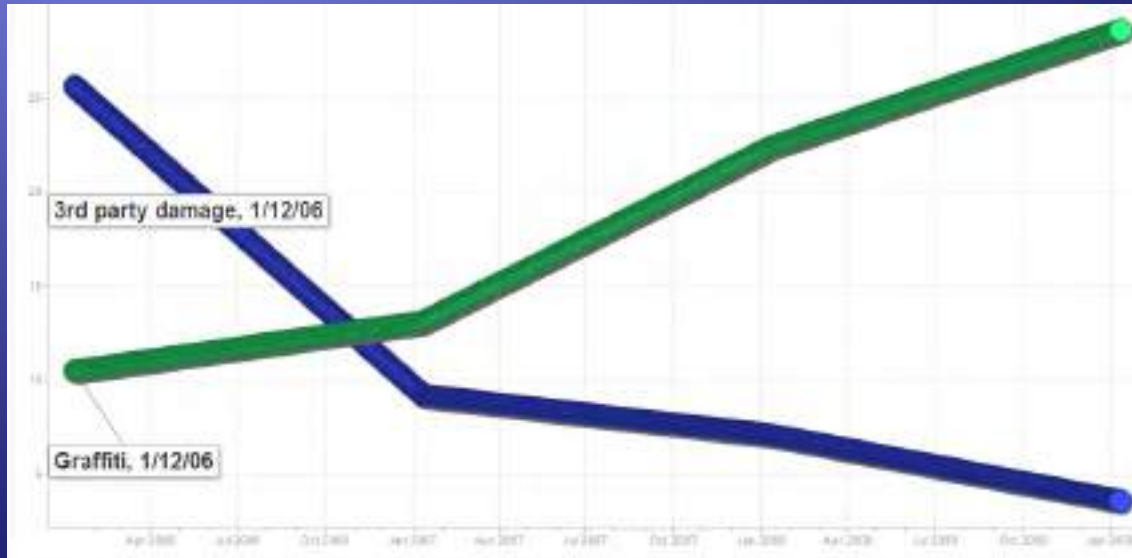

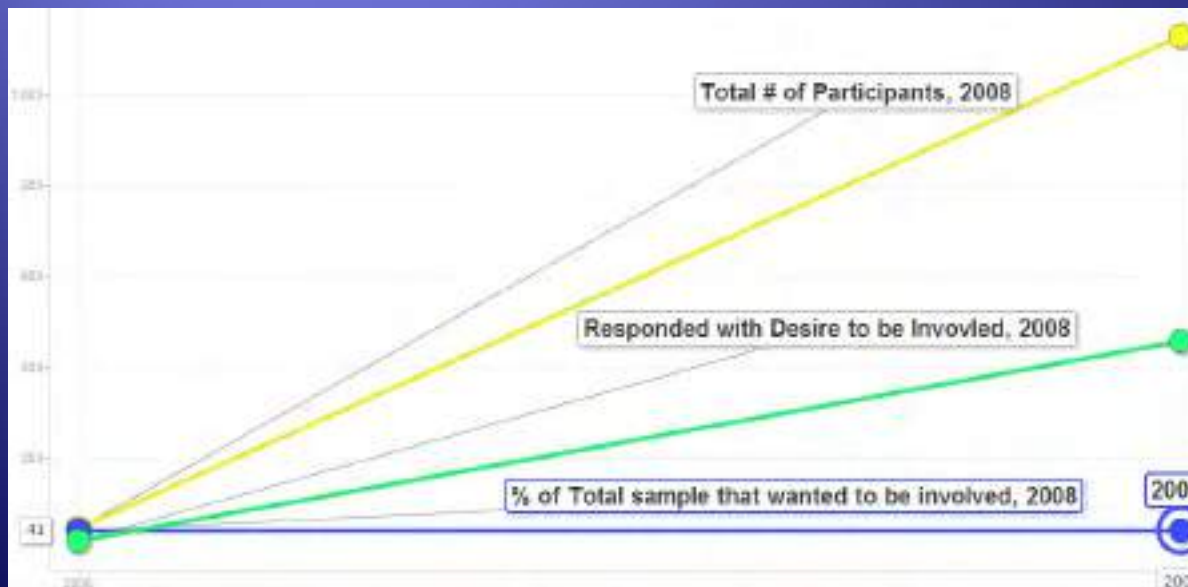

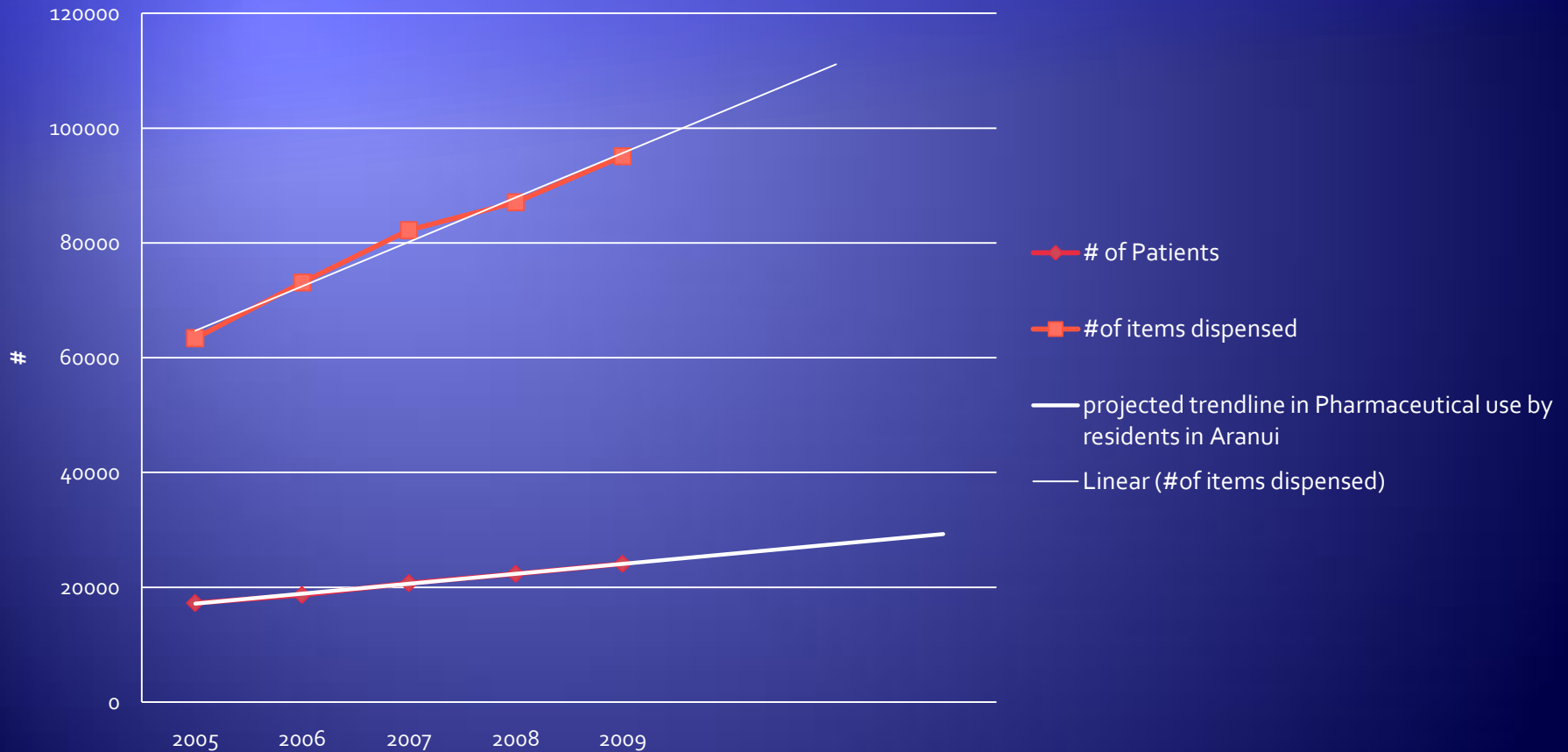

COMMUNITY SURVEYS



- A door to door Survey to 2600 homes. Questions based on our 5 result areas, evaluating how Aranui is doing in each of these areas and what needs to happen to improve.
- To highlight the opinions of the community on the work and the state of the result areas to date, to elicit a hope that things could improve and highlight common solutions and suggestions for improvement.
- To highlight those members of the community that wanted to be involved and who wanted more information about the continuing development work.
- If possible evaluate the work of the Aranui Community Trust and the renewal / community development process to date across the Aranui community.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FACILITATOR

KEY FACTS FROM THE SURVEY

- ◆ 1130 questionnaires returned from 2700 homes
- ◆ Mean time the individuals from the sample had lived in Aranui 15yrs
- ◆ 89% of the sample thought Aranui was a good place to live.
- ◆ 78% thought there was community spirit in Aranui
- ◆ 62% thought community spirit had increased over recent years.
- ◆ 41% of the sample wanted to be involved in some of the future work of ACTIS
- ◆ 48% wanted to find out more information
- ◆ 57% of the sample attributed the increase in community spirit directly to the activities of ACTIS.
- ◆ 26% of the sample attribute the increase in community spirit was to do with knowing their neighbours.
- ◆ 45% suggest that community wide actions were the best way to continue development on the result areas
- ◆ 25% suggest that individuals need to act themselves to make change effective across the 5 result areas in the Aranui community
- ◆ 23% suggest that wider social solutions need to be better to effect change and see result across the 5 result areas.
- ◆ 7% believe that the result areas can be effected by action and solutions that take place at a local street level.

ARANUI BASELINE HEALTH STATISTICS 2008-2009

Aranui has more than 225% more individuals present at Accident and Emergency with no trauma than the Christchurch suburban mean. (Aranui presentations in 2009= 1193, Christchurch Suburban Mean 2009 = 366)

Aranui impatient admissions through Acute is over 200% more than the Christchurch city Mean, and over 400% more than normal admissions.

Aranui is the 5th largest domicile in number of outpatient appointments made across the CDHB.

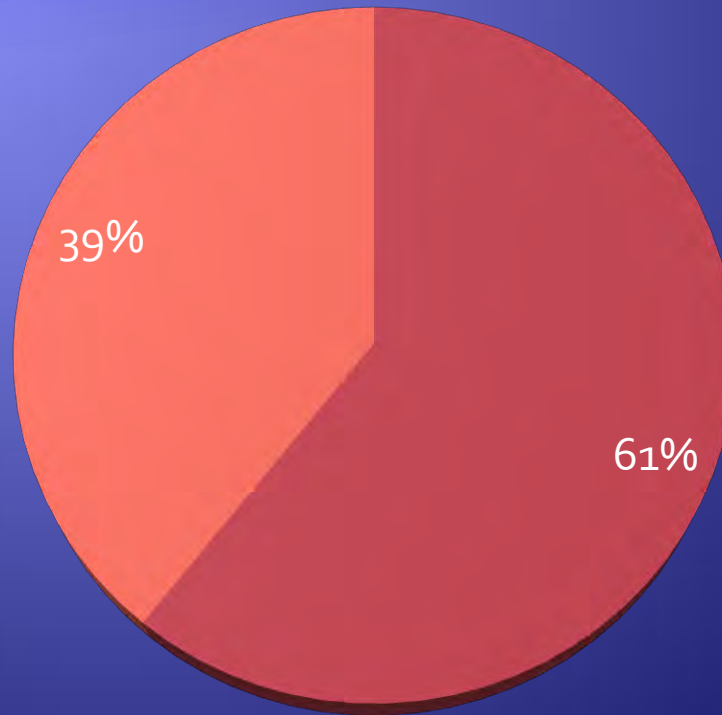

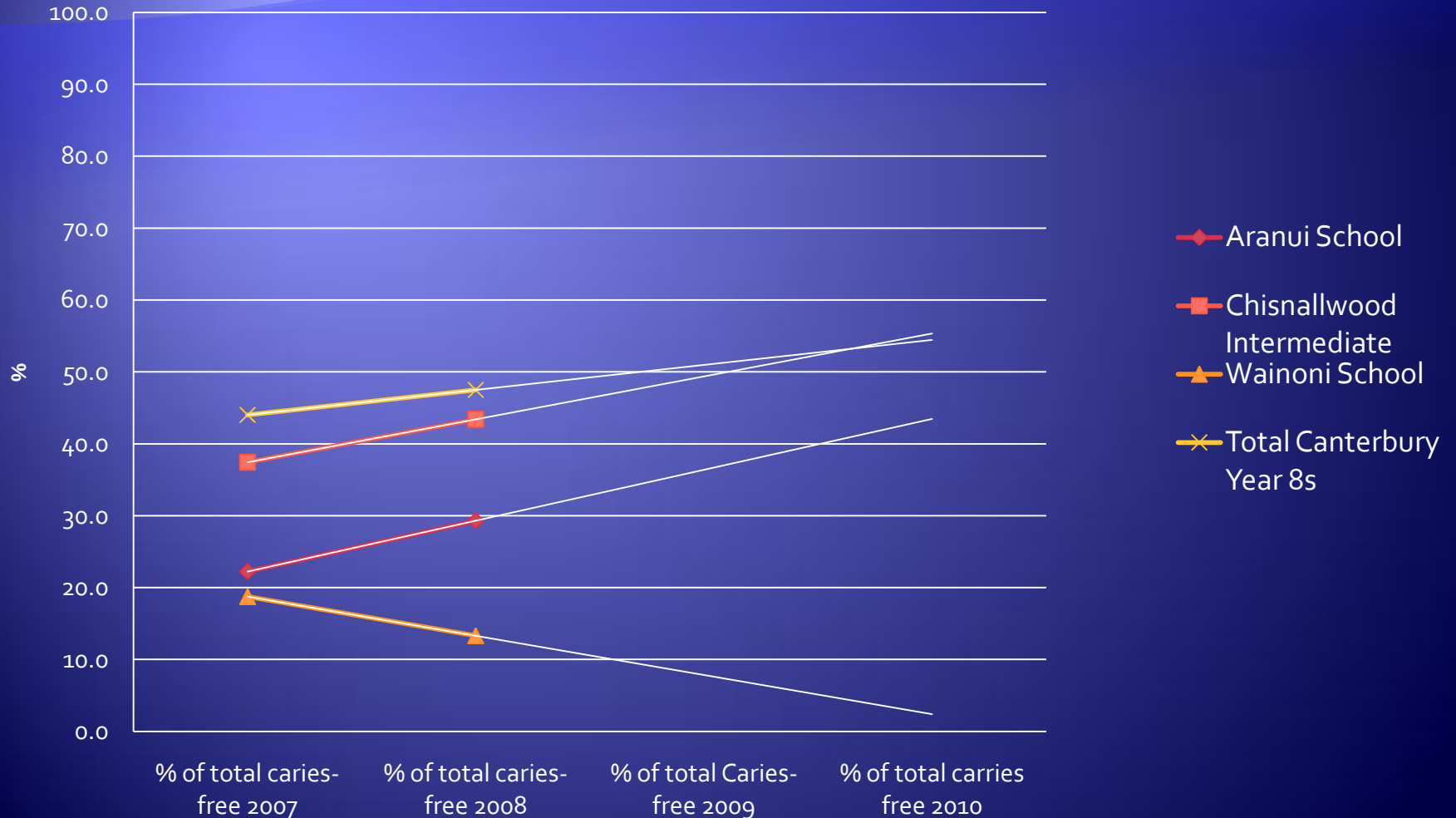
Participation rates in local Health Care centres by Aranui and other communities - Jan 2009

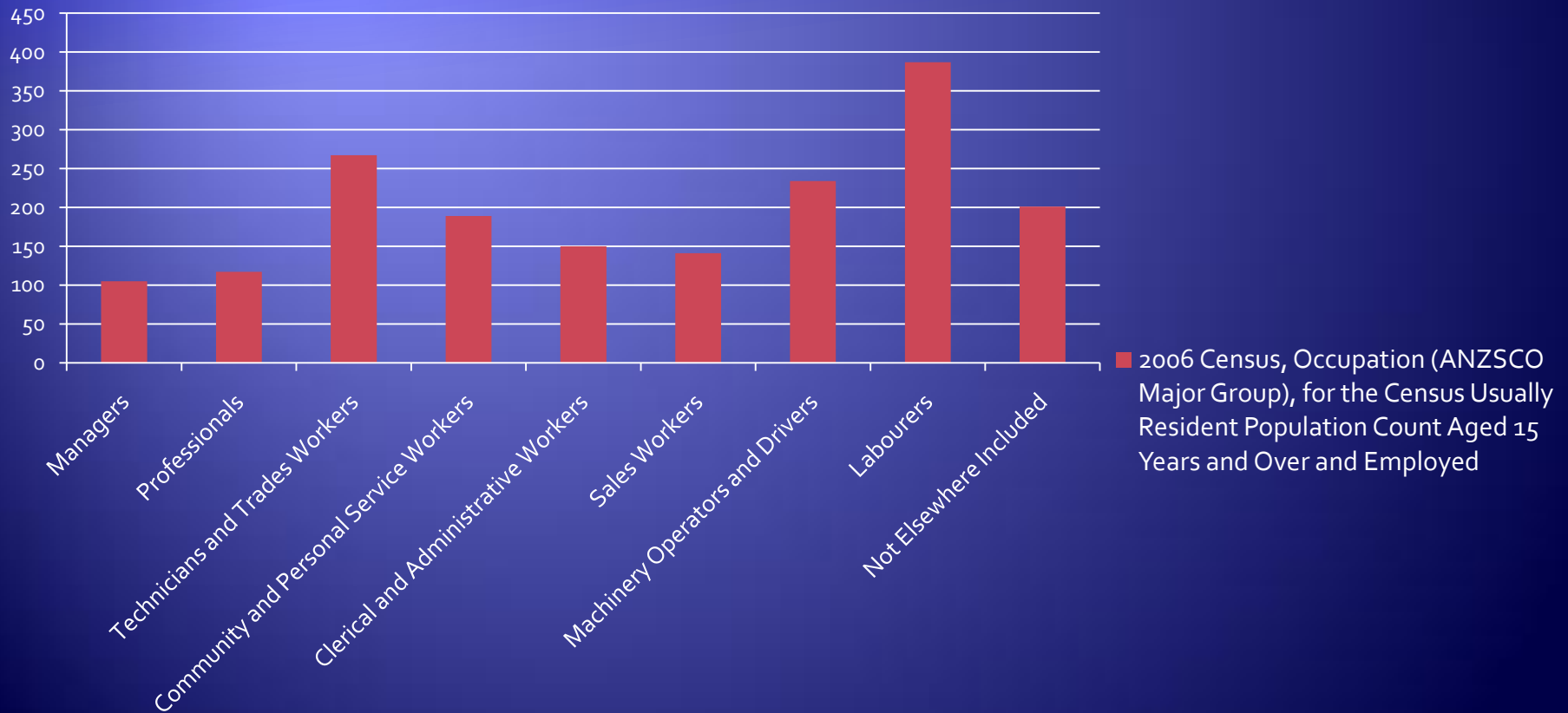

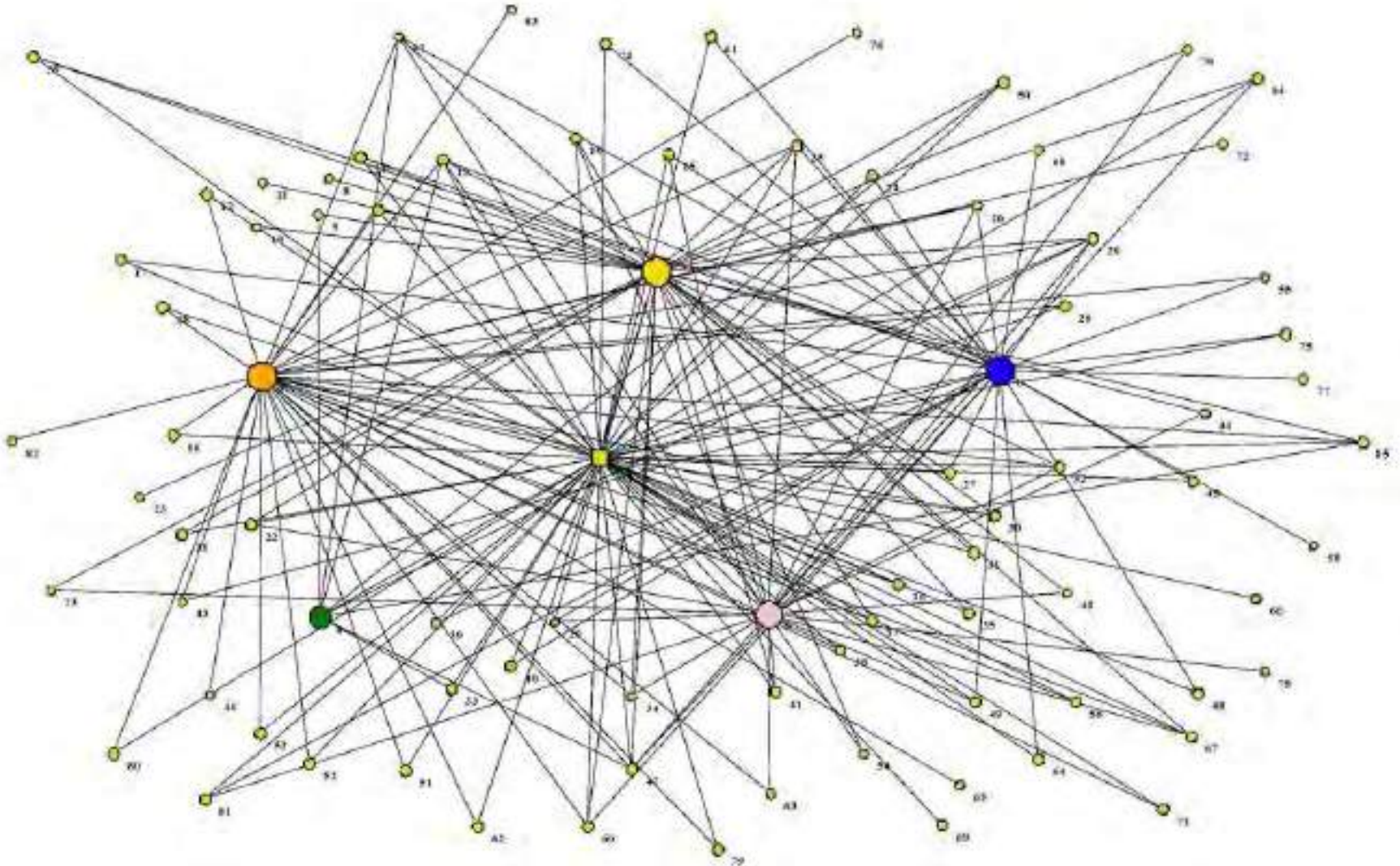

% distribution of organisations working in result areas

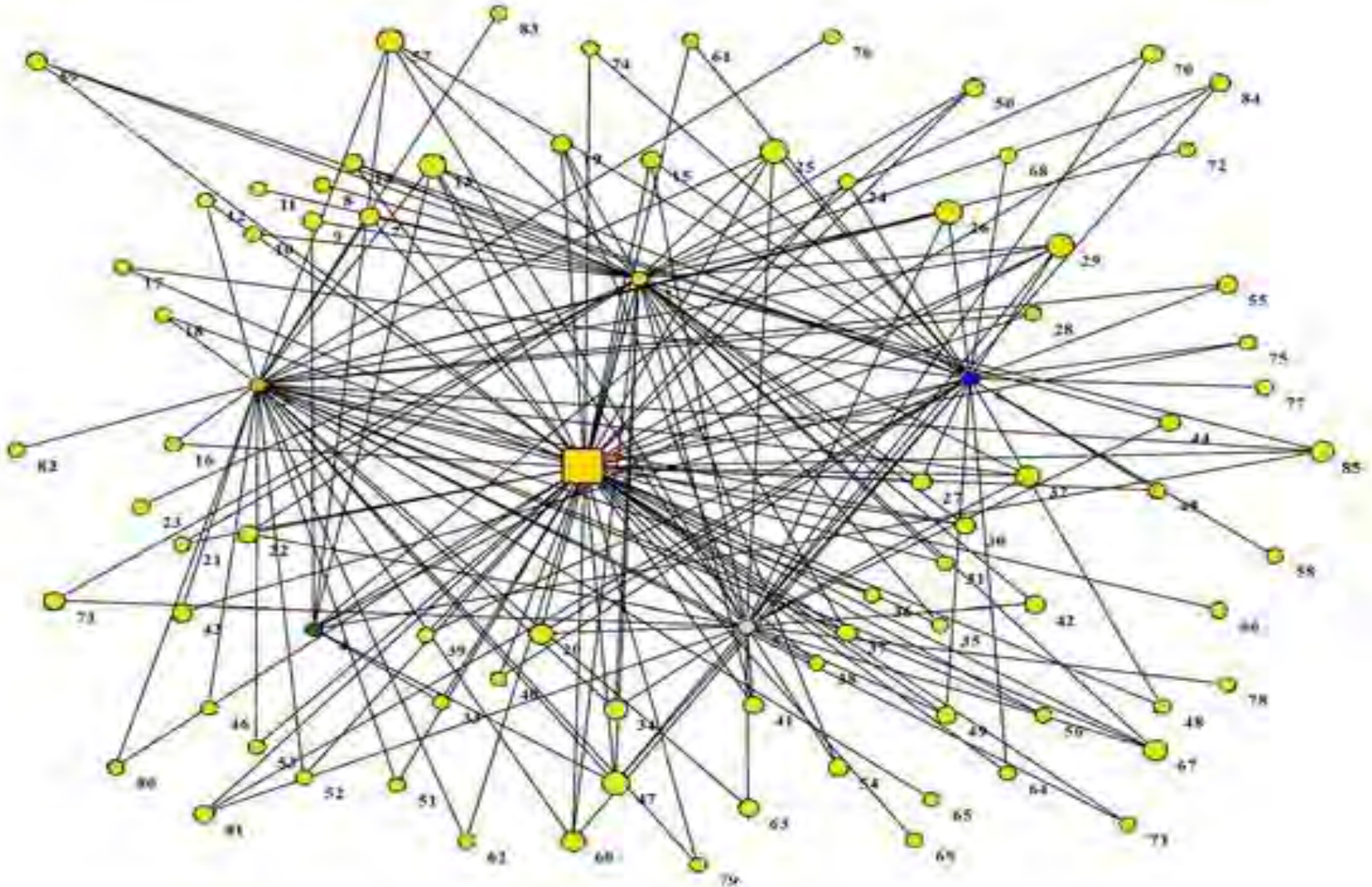

HOUSING

Housing New Zealand's redevelopment in Aranui began in October 2002 with the demolition of three multi-unit blocks. Ten new homes have been built on the site, which were completed and tenanted by May 2003. This redevelopment won New Zealand Institute of Architects and Registered Master Builders Federation awards for design and quality of build.

The redevelopment continued, with multi-unit blocks pulled down and replaced by new single storey dwellings on several sites throughout the suburb.
