

- work with the TEC and NZQA.




How well is the tertiary system doing?

Outcomes of tertiary education are positive and improving:

- Educational achievement is increasing, with more people in study, in higher levels of study, and completing the qualifications they begin – including more Māori and Pasifika
- Many students are seeing good outcomes from their study, with their efforts being repaid by better rates of employment and pay, and better health and social outcomes.

Where is tertiary education heading?

For tertiary education to deliver what New Zealand needs and successfully adapt to change, the tertiary education system needs to:

- improve the relevance of tertiary education
- reach more learners who might not otherwise participate or achieve in tertiary education
- continuously evolve to meet the changing needs of learners,
 communities and the economy one size does not fit all.



The Tertiary Education Strategy and ACE

As stewards of the system, we are using the Tertiary Education Strategy (TES) to shape how we think about tertiary education.

The TES has six priorities:

- Priority 1: Delivering skills for industry
- Priority 2: Getting at-risk young people into a career
- Priority 3: Boosting achievement of Māori and Pasifika
- Priority 4: Improving adult literacy and numeracy
- Priority 5: Strengthening research-based institutions
- Priority 6: Growing international linkages

The purpose of ACE funding in tertiary education

The purpose of the Adult and Community Education (ACE) fund is to provide community-based education, foundation skills, and pathways into other learning opportunities that meet community learning needs.

The three priorities of ACE are to:

- target learners whose initial learning was not successful
- raise foundation skills
- strengthen social cohesion, enhancing a learner's ability to participate in society and economic life.
